Annual Meeting Minutes

29 January 2023

1. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 10:20 a.m. by President Su Erickson.

2. Opening Liturgy/Prayer

Pastor Jeffrey Gallen led the meeting attendees in prayer. The Annual Congregation Meeting Liturgy was read responsively.

3. Appointment of Tellers and Parliamentarian

President Erickson announced the tellers: David Bruce, Tony Fabrello, David Gregor and Dave Moonan. Mr. Fabrello and Mr. Moonan were both ill and couldn't attend the meeting. Fred Wordell and Ken Olson were appointed as tellers. Ann Bruce was appointed Parliamentarian and Renata Spanton-Jones took notes in the absence of Secretary Jim Harmon.

4. Approval of Minutes from 2022 Annual Congregation Meeting and 2022 Special Meeting

Motion: Jim Capelli moved to approve the minutes of the 2022 Annual meeting and the 2022 Special meeting held January 30, 2022. Peggy Bjornson seconded. President Erickson asked for additions or corrections. The minutes were approved with no additions or corrections.

5. Review of 2022 Staff and Council Reports and 2022 Audit report.

2022 Staff and Council reports and the 2022 Audit report (2021 financial records) were posted in advance of the meeting. President asked if there were any comments or questions. Hearing none, the reports will be filed.

6. Review of the 2023 Mission Spending Plan

John Brown, CELC Administrator reviewed the 2022 financials and thanked the financial team for their service: Ann Bruce, Treasurer, Sharoll Blodgett, Bookkeeper, and the weekly counters,

John Brown presented the 2023 Mission Spending Plan in which he is projecting \$415,452 in income and \$429,566 in expenses which leads to a projected loss of \$14,114. Our main expense is salaries, and we gave all employees a 5% raise for 2023. We have also raised the rent for our 3 churches by \$200 a month and raised rent for AA also. We are hoping for a \$21,000 gain income and will try to keep expenses in line with 2022.

In comparing 2022 budget with 2022 actual numbers our expenses were \$36,400 less than income because giving was down and expenses were up by \$12,900 over 2021. Our actual loss for the year was \$14,000 from the general fund. We refinanced our mortgage in Feb. of 2022

and have stopped making extra principal payments on the mortgage. This allowed us to establish and pay a communication manager's salary of approximately \$12,000/year. We will have ongoing expenses for the backflow valve and sewer project into 2023 of about \$22,000. These are currently being paid from Designated Funds.

We had a gain of \$34,000 in equity in 2022 and have a continuing mortgage liability of \$827,000.

7. Declaration of a quorum

President Erickson confirmed with the tellers that a quorum was present.

8. Nominating Committee Report

President Erickson presented the nominations for Council positions. She then asked for nominations for each position from the floor. Hearing none, nominations closed.

9. Constitution and Bylaws

The Council brought the motion to update the CELC constitution and bylaws.

- Approve to amend the CELC Constitution to conform to the 2022 ELCA Model Constitution for Congregations
- Approve C12.01: Remove the <u>requirement</u> of youth and young adult.
 The voting membership of the Congregation Council shall consist of the
 pastor(s), the officers of congregation and not less than six (6) or more than
 eighteen (18) members of the congregation, at least one of which shall be a
 youth and at least one of whom shall be a young adult.
- Approve C13.02: Change number of people on nominating committee from six to <u>five</u> and <u>appoint by Congregation Council</u> rather than elect at annual meeting.

- A Nominating Committee of-six-five voting members of this congregation, two
 of whom shall be outgoing members of the council, shall be elected at the
 annual meeting appointed by the Congregation Council for a term of one year.
- Approve the CELC Bylaws as presented

10. Solar Project

Motion presented from Council to pursue the lease option with SCP Solar to install and provide solar to CELC. There was a brief discussion with a question about adding a battery back up for the facilities.

11. Casting of Written Congregational ballot

Ballots were distributed to attendees and votes were cast for Council members, the 2023 Mission Spending Plan, Constitution and Bylaws and Solar project.

12. Appointment of the 2023 Nominating committee

No volunteers for committee. The Council will appoint a nominating committee.

13. Recognition of out-going council members and other ministry volunteers

President Erickson and Pastor Gallen thanked outgoing council members for serving and presented them with a gift. Connie Sornsin – Stewardship/Vice President, Elizabeth Richardson – Youth, Jeri Nowatka – Outreach, and Olga Blanchard – Health/Parish Nurse. Marian See was also recognized for her years of service as Altar Guild Coordinator and was presented with a special gift made by the CELC quilters.

14. Report from Tellers

President Erickson called for election results. 61 ballots were cast. All ballot items were approved: election of council members, constitution and bylaws, solar project, 2023 Mission Spending Plan.

15. Closing Comments and Prayer

President Erickson called for closing comments. Someone suggested painting the Building B sanctuary. President Erickson took note and referred the item to the Facilities and Maintenance committee. There was a thank you to Miloy for leading praise and worship, as well as Pastor Jeff for his continued service and inspiration. Pastor Gallen led closing prayer.

16. Adjournment

Connie Sornsin moved to adjourn the meeting. Wes Yost seconded. The meeting adjourned at 11:07 a.m.

Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church Special Congregational Meeting December 10, 2023

1. Call to Order

President Su Erickson called the meeting to order at 10:14 a.m. A quorum was present to conduct business.

2. Purpose of meeting

Our constitution requires the council to get congregational approval to incur obligations of more than \$25,000 in excess of anticipated receipts. The purpose of this meeting was to authorize the CELC Council to spend up to \$75,000 for the sewer project.

3. Motion

Ann Bruce, treasurer, presented a brief background of the sewer project and information on how the project would be funded. Su Erickson asked for a motion to authorize the council to spend up to \$75,000 for the sewer project. So moved by Jim Capelli and seconded by Karen Olson. No questions or comments. Motion approved unanimously. (81 votes)

4. Adjournment

Motion to adjourn by Jim Harmon. Seconded by Dave Bruce. The meeting was adjourned at 10:25 a.m.

The Echo of Silence

In the echo of silence,
The whispers of the divine are heard,

There comes a time in a person's life when one passes the baton to a new generation of leadership. This coming October I will retire from service to Christ Evangelical Lutheran church of Goodyear and pass that baton. This report is more a reflection of the past twenty six years. Please read the reports from the leadership team to look back over 2023.

There is a Japanese concept, 'ikigai' which translates to 'a reason for being;' a reason to get up in the morning, to enjoy the meaning of life-passion, purpose, something one lives for. This has been my journey for over forty plus years. While I end my pastorate at CELC my journey continues. I am required to separate myself (not Renae) from worshiping with you for a year as you seek new leadership.

My ikigai is, was, and will always be, serving Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. I truly haven't worked a day in my life. It is who I am. This doesn't mean I didn't make mistakes, I did.

Hopefully I learned the lessons God was and is teaching me along the way and passed them on to the communities I served. Thank you for allowing me the privilege of serving you these past years. Here are some truths I wish to leave you with as I bid farewell.

First, in your spiritual life it is much more important to know how to listen than to know how to talk. I have come to see that I can't provide answers for others. All I can do is accompany another and help them listen to themselves. People want to be understood. So continue working on your listening skills. You will be blessed you did. Just remember, in the face of struggle, suffering and death, your listening presence, not your words, mean everything.

Secondly, come to see and understand that there is no past or future. Now is where love breathes. Be in this moment, now is all there is. Oh the wasted time I have spent living in the past and the future while missing the beauty of the now. Jesus tells us that the kingdom of God is now. Embrace your now, breathe it in, celebrate this precious gift of life, now. We never know when it will be our last in this world. There is poem by Mary Oliver that speaks of now, "It doesn't have to be the blue iris, it could be weeds in a vacant lot, or a few small stones; just pay attention, then patch a few words together and don't try to make them elaborate, this isn't a contest but the doorway into thanks, and a silence in which another voice may speak."

Third, the late Rabbi Abraham Herschel said, "Life without wonder is not worth living." I have known people, while stationed overseas, who never ventured off base to experience the beauty of God's glorious creation in a different country. You are invited to be surprised by God's mystery. It is what connects us to the world when feeling alone. Be amazed, astonished, awed. Take the time to watch a sunrise or sunset, hold a newborn baby, sit in silence, tell your beloved that you love them. When was the last time you wondered about God's love for you and His assurance of salvation? No time like the present.

Fourth, our life is a call to service. When Jesus said, "Love your neighbor as yourself," there wasn't any fine print about who is not included. Pay attention to your walk of faith rather than your talk. There is no greater evidence of your faith than how you treat all people. Following Jesus means following a leader who remained humble, never got rich, eschewed violence, supported the vulnerable, and never exploited power for personal gain. Show compassion, be kind, let your love light shine, be the light.

Finally, the question and the answer is and will be forever and always, love. Our Lutheran theology would say, "ALL IS GRACE." God has got this. There is no entrance exam, we don't earn salvation, we simply receive. There is a Rumi poem titled "Out Beyond Ideas" that captures this amazing love. Out beyond ideas of wrongdoing and rightdoing, there is a field. I'll meet you there. When the soul lies down in that grass, the world is too full to talk about. Ideas, language, even the phrase 'each other' doesn't make any sense. The greatest gift of life is a faith active in love.

Message from the Council President

The time has come for me to sit down and put words to paper so that all of the ministry reports can be compiled into our 2023 Annual Report. Last year I wrote about "liminal space", the inbetween. Liminal space is all about transition, a time of waiting and unable to see the future. Richard Rohr describes this space as "where we are betwixt and between the familiar and the completely unknown."

We entered into a formal time of transition this year, with Pastor Jeff announcing to the church council that he planned to retire in October 2024. The council began talks at their spring retreat with Gayle Denny leading the council in a review of the visioning survey notes from three years ago and then an exercise to get us to think about the future possibilities for CELC. I reviewed transition documents on the Grand Canyon Synod website and contacted the Synod transition team soon after. Once Pastor Jeff announced to the congregation this fall, the questions began. I want to assure everyone that there is a very formal process that we will take part in this year to figure out the next steps to call a new pastor to CELC. Communication and transparency are key throughout this process.

This year I look forward to a year of "radical resilience" as is the theme of Richard Rohr's daily meditations. He wrote that "...resilience is the secular word for faith — the ability to trust and let go." We may not know what the future holds, but I believe God is working with and in us to continue the ministries that we support. This will be an opportunity for CELC to explore where we came from, who we are, and who do we want to be in the future. We may have to let go of things in order to find a new path forward, but this is an exciting time, and the possibilities are limitless. The Council and transition teams will be looking for your input as we embark on this new journey.

I want to thank everyone who has supported me throughout my term as president; the CELC church council, Pastor Jeff, Renata, Jonathan, Miloy, Ruben, Jim and the members who offered kind words of support and hours of action in and around the CELC community. We truly are a community of faith in action.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

<u>Sewer Project.</u> We obtained a permit from the City of Goodyear after drawing plans through an engineering firm to reroute our sewer line and pump system. The firm proposed a new line leading from the pump area northward to our parking lot. The Council approved a proposal by Cactus Plumbing and Air. Their proposal included replacing the three sewer outlet's lines where they exit Building A and connecting them to the north parking lot. At a special meeting on 12/10/23 the congregation voted to approve the project. The project is currently underway and may finish in as little as a week. A grant was submitted to West Valley Lutheran Thrift Store, and we received \$6,000 toward our sewer project. An insurance claim was submitted to The Hanover Group, our property insurance company for possible reimbursement of damages.

<u>Solar Project.</u> The proposal for a three-canopy project was approved at our 2022 Annual Meeting. We signed a 20-year lease and made a down payment to Solar Covered Parking (SCP). We reviewed the engineering plans for the project. SCP submitted the project plans to the City of Goodyear, which led them to hire GEOTEK, a geotechnical company. GEOTEK removed and analyzed soil samples that were 25 feet deep. After some delays GEOTEK submitted their report, and SCP forwarded it to the city. We await the city's approval and permitting to proceed with the construction and installation. The solar project should begin in early 2024.

Backflow Valves. Metro Fire removed the old and installed a new backflow valve in the southwest corner of our property. They also repaired the leaky backflow valve on the northeast corner. Upon inspection the leaky backflow valve directly east of Building A was repaired, after which all backflow valves passed the required inspection.

<u>Structure.</u> Two red benches were installed and bolted to the concrete walkway at the front (west side) of Building B. They have received welcome and increasing use especially on Outreach days.

Building A. We replaced the commode in the bathroom next to the sanctuary entrance, after the sewer line was reconnected. The sanctuary light fixtures were cleaned, and burned-out bulbs were replaced with LED's. A dome-and-barrel shaped awning was installed by The House of Canvas to cover the entrance to the sanctuary and protect the large all-wood doors from weathering. Following the installation, the doors were refinished and, in the future, should require less maintenance. The canopy project received grant money from the West Valley Lutheran Thrift Store in the amount of \$2,500. Weathering plywood was removed from two openings on the exterior west gable area and each opening was covered by sheet metal with a vent, then painted. The attic received some maintenance. Two non-functioning air conditioning units were removed. Fiberglass insulation was checked and reworked where needed. Soffit vents were checked for ventilation and opened if needed. The wrought iron gate hinge on the southwest corner was repaired. The office received new lights with fans. The office bathroom

received new paint, new sink fixtures, a new mirror, and a new light fixture. Both rooms were also rearranged and redecorated. A water leak in the office bathroom required HVAC repairs. The chancel carpet was cleaned. A broken window was replaced on the northeast corner. The sanctuary's motorized projector screen fell to the floor twice and was rehung both times.

Roof, Building B. Diversified Roofing resealed select areas during the summer. Water-stained ceiling tiles were replaced. A leak in the choir area required an HVAC repair.

<u>Kitchen, Building B</u>. Metro Fire inspected the ventilating hood and found that the fan does not run when the fire alarm is activated. An electrician is working this issue with an inspector. A similar issue occurred last year. Estrella Plumbing replaced a leaky faucet in the large triple sink. The sink drains receive Simple Green monthly and the outdoor grease collection tanks are drained every six months. These measures prevent the pipes from clogging and preserve the tanks. The water-cooling portion of the exhaust hood was reactivated.

Building B. A commode in the women's restroom was replaced. Johnson Controls completed testing and inspection of our fire alarm system. The insulation around the perimeter and above the suspended ceilings was checked and tucked in where needed. The Chancel carpet was cleaned. Southwest Gas replaced our gas meter. It had fallen off the gas line. Johnson Controls installed the new fire alarm system based on a cell phone alert. Cox phone lines are to be vacated.

<u>HVAC Units.</u> Our fourteen new digital thermostats with wireless capability have worked flawlessly in maintaining temperatures in both buildings. Each HVAC unit continues to receive filter changes and required maintenance through Masters and Sons. This year a few of our units required new fan belts. One required new electronic parts.

<u>Security.</u> ADT upgraded our system control panel in the telecommunications closet in the storage room of Building B. The touch panel on the east door next to the choir area now allows that door to be exited after setting the security alarm. ADT also replaced two defective window breakage detectors and the siren, which was not compatible with the new control panel. The sound of the siren is not as loud, nor as startling as the previous siren.

<u>Deep Cleaning Day.</u> A hardy group of church members power washed Building B kitchen carts, mobile shelves, tables, and chairs. Building A chairs were included. Afterwards lunch was served.

<u>Landscaping.</u> RV Landscaping repaired two-line leaks and replaced two defective valves which corrected our increased water usage. Pocket gophers remain an issue. A few of our large trees were trimmed. An overgrown plant was removed.

<u>Signage</u>, The Litchfield Road sign's plexiglass was cleaned and displays Sunday Worship at 9 AM. The north side displays our URL: <u>www.christgoodyear.org</u>.

NFL Green. A crew of volunteers moved 14,000 square feet of donated outdoor green turf from State Farm Stadium to unit in StorAmerica's facility near our church. The plan includes placing

the turf on the eastern frontage area of our campus. This should improve our esthetics and prevent gopher surfacing.

<u>Parking Lot.</u> We replaced two pole lights with LED bulbs. Several areas should be replaced with new asphalt, cracks should be filled, the surface should be resealed, and new pavement markings painted. This will be considered following the completion of the sewer and the solar projects.

Maintenance Man, Jonathan Gonzales. I wish to pay a complement to our maintenance man. We are fortunate to have him. He continues to keep our facilities sparkling both inside and out. His religious and public relations skills and grasp of both English and Spanish serve our community expertly. And he is willing to lend a hand to anyone on any project, often before we know we need him.

THANK YOU! It is a true pleasure to report that many church members have volunteered time, energy, and/or advice to plan and execute the projects that keep our church buildings operational and our grounds well-groomed and attractive. With a grateful heart, I thank each and every one who helped in some way.

Evangelism & Membership Annual Report 2023

Evangelism

- 1. There are seven new members this year, down from 14 in 2022.
- 2. All members have been given name tags but about half the congregation don't wear them and don't see the importance of name tags as "visitor aides" or as representative of CELC hospitality. Discussion of how to improve tag use is ongoing.
- 3. Visitor cards are still given to new visitors, but with a simplified format of only 4 questions broadly spread on the back of the card and directions to answer more questions on the front of the card IF they want to. Thanks to an ad hoc member of the team, each visitor card is attached to a small clip board and pen for greater stability. Legibility has improved.

Membership

- 1. Phone calls (voice mail messages), email, and note cards are still a staple of behind-the scenes to members in distress or in celebration of a special event.
- 2. 200+ Advent cards were sent to all CELC members and church leaders of churches in our buildings. Cards were sent to all 2023 visitors as well by the 12 team members.
- 3. A Book Exchange for all church members and their families took place three times this year, set up before and after Sunday church services, displayed on the new red benches outside the main doors of Bldg. B. The like-new books are popular and those leftover each Sunday are taken to the Veterans Administration by David Gregor.
- 4. "Members in Touch" continues as a column in The Weekly Church Announcements with a wide range of concerns and activities, ending with "Watch This Space." The Members In Touch" table close to the entry doors will continue in 2024.

5. Prayer shawls and "God's Hugs" made by Ellory Christianson and distributed by the E/M team are happy points of interest. Ellory has donated dozens of each.

Goals for 2024

- 1. Better use of name tags for hospitality and ID.
- 2. Provide paper directories for those not on-line and those using both paper and computer.
- 3. Improve prayer list in the weekly announcements to facilitate the list as a resource for contact
- 4. Help assemble a list of CELC accomplishments to post and give out to visitors and members.
- 5. Designate member sponsors for prospective members, to attend the new members meeting with them and help them for a few months.
- 6. Build awareness of small but significant points of vulnerability for members: extreme heat of summer, hardship isolation, arrival and exit of snowbirds, etc.
- 7. Get more details on people involved in baptisms, graduations, and other special events.
- 8. Creation of a more permanent group of team members to divide duties.

AED/CPR Training provided by the Goodyear Fire Department on Saturday 4/22/23 with 14 participants. Training included CPR with card certification offered. AED training and orientation to our new AED machines located in the main sanctuary and fellowship hall.

Flu shot clinic not provided this year due to increased cost for the church to provide an onsite clinic.

IT/Technology

We continue to look at ways to use technology to support our ministry at CELC and to do it in a cost effective manner. Here are some highlights for 2023.

Alarms/Door access systems – Looking at the state of these systems was a priority in 2023 with some actions taken. Two systems were updated which allowed us to save about \$2000 annually by eliminating phone landlines that were no longer required and cancelling no longer needed contracts.

Door Alarm Systems – The door alarm system in Building B was updated. ADT replaced our existing system which gave us some additional capabilities and also allowed us to eliminate a phone line we were paying for in Building B. It was also discovered that CELC was still paying ADT for a contract on an unused alarm system in Building A which has now been cancelled.

Fire Alarm Monitoring system – Johnson Controls updated our fire monitoring system that calls the Fire department If there is ever a fire event. A new system with Cellular Call out in the event of a fire allowed us to remove two landline phone lines in Building B.

Door Access system – Proposals for updating our existing Door Access system were evaluated but could not be justified economically. We will continue to look at this in 2024.

Voice Phone Systems – It was determined that a second voice line coming into the office was no longer justified and it was removed. This along with the changes to the alarm systems described above has allowed CELC to significantly reduce payments to our voice line provider.

Audio/Video – There were a number of changes to our Audio/Video systems. A big thank you to the Sound/Tech Booth support team – Ruben Salgado, Stacy Anderson, Jan & Wes Yost and Magan Ratalasky who work with me to staff the Sound Booth every Sunday on a rotating basis

New Choir area microphones – Equipment was purchased (using music dedicated funds) and installed that allowed the Choir area to put a number of new microphones in place allowing for better coverage of the choir when they are singing.

Streaming – CELC continues to stream our services with an average of 19.3 livestream views during the service each week, and an average of an additional 26.0 views of the replay during the week. A method to enhance the viewer's feeling of being a part of the service was put in place at the end of the year.

Sanctuary A – Major issues with the projector screen in the Building A Sanctuary were resolved. Many thanks to the help of Randy Heibel and Paul Sanchez (from Casa Del Rey) for spending some uncomfortable time up in the attic above the Building A sanctuary. Also, the sewer project required that the Sound Room in Building A Sanctuary be emptied. In 2024, we will work with our rental partners to decide how best to put it back together.

Computers/Networks - Not many changes to our computer or data communication setup in 2023. We continue to support 7 Windows desktop machines and 3 laptops. We established guest WiFi networks in both Building A and Building B.

Outreach

For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, Matthew 25:35

2023 was a year of learning, crying, teaching, hosting, partnering, and reaching out. My goal this year was to learn as much as I could about CELC Outreach ministries and share information with the congregation. When the term "OUTREACH" is used at CELC, most people associate it with the Tuesday morning food pantry. It is our largest program and has been in existence since 2004, however, CELC also reaches out through other programs and agencies.

- CELC supports the ministries of Lutheran Social Services of the Southwest (LSS-SW), Pan De Vida, Spirit in the Desert and the Grand Canyon Synod through our benevolence giving. The Council also voted this year to support the Cactus Conference Youth and Young Adult program. CELC provides overnight lodging to participants in the LSS-SW I-HELP (Interfaith Homeless Emergency Lodging Program) twice a week. Members and community members provide a hot meal and clothing is offered through the generous donations we receive.
- Whenever there is a call for special needs (monetary or items), CELC members contribute to meet those needs. In October, Patsy Blankenship collected donations for Manna Bags and put together over 95 bags for CELC members to distribute to the homeless. October was also Socktober month, focusing on collecting socks and underwear. In December, we collected gift cards for Bosom Buddies and a member of their group purchased personal gifts for the women in the program.
- CELC provides regular meeting space for support groups: AA, Bosom Buddies, Alzheimer's Support group (zoom meetings mostly), and Duet Caregivers and Grandparent's. groups.

The CELC Outreach Food Pantry is affiliated with St. Mary's Food Bank which is also a part of the Feeding America program. I met with our St. Mary's Food Bank liaison in February and attended their annual conference in March. I studied and received the Serv-Safe Food Protection Manager Certification in March. The CELC food pantry is fully licensed by Maricopa County, and we continue to receive an "A" rating on our twice-yearly kitchen/pantry inspections. St. Mary's also inspects our kitchen and pantry annually.

The CELC Outreach Ministry through its Tuesday food distribution program provided over **3,381 food boxes** (avg 68 per week) and provided food for over **15,815 individuals** during this past year. These boxes provided food for an average of 282 families per month plus emergency boxes for members in our community. In 2023, CELC experienced a 25% increase in the number of households served and a 26% increase in the number of individuals served over 2022.

Outreach income for the year was \$29,392 and expenses were \$23,563. Food was purchased weekly from St. Mary's Food Bank, to supplement the donations received. We distributed over 177,318.48 lbs. of food from St. Mary's, Basha's, Panera, Pizza Hut, Wildflower, and members of our congregation. The 2023 Souper Bowl event raised \$1177 and 131 cans of soup and

Cheerios was declared the winner (2 years in a row) in the March Madness Cereal Bowl which added 83 boxes of cereal and \$227 to our outreach efforts.

Did you know that there are over **35 volunteers** who set up tables, weigh, sort food and store food, register households, fill boxes, drive to St. Mary's weekly, pick-up food from our grocery rescue partners (Panera and Basha's), direct traffic in the parking lot, and distribute boxes? In June, we hosted 100 youth and parents from the Church of Litchfield Park youth. They spent a Tuesday morning learning about food insecurity and homeless persons and assisted CELC volunteers by prepping and filling food boxes.

In November, we received food donations from three companies: Prime Solutions Group, Inc. (PSG), 212.65 lbs., Lennox Industries, 450 lbs., and West USA Realty, 249.30 lbs. PSG also adopted one of our Outreach families for Christmas and provided them with gifts. We look forward to partnering with these companies in 2024.

Tuesday Boutique sales of donated furniture, clothes and household items totaled more than \$4100. Funds were used to purchase supplies and food for the program. A special thanks to Ardyce Durand for sorting, pricing, and selling the donated goods.

The CELC Outreach team remembers Kay Myers, who passed away February 1, 2023. Kay led with a smile and offered words of encouragement for everyone. She dedicated many hours to Outreach each week, including serving on Council as Director of the program.

past year 20 quilts were distributed to the New Life Center, 16 lap robes for the Veterans Hospital, as well as providing for 4 baptisms and 1 graduation from high school.

Fabric, used cotton sheets, and monetary donations are welcomed. The fall craft fair is to provide for the main expense of batting for the quilts. The group welcomes anyone interested in the goal, regardless of sewing skills. There are tasks for the experienced seamstress to someone who can thread a needle or wield a scissors.

Stewardship

Your CELC Council meets every month throughout the year. During 2023 the income and expenses were monitored and supervised as in past years.

Over \$600 was raised from the recycling of aluminum cans and plastic water bottles. Funds were put into our facility grounds improvements. Members participating in the Fry's Community Rewards program have a portion of their purchases donated to CELC. Fry's donated \$241.88 to CELC.

Stewardship involves more than finances. It also involves time and talents. As you will see in other council member reports, CELC of Goodyear supports numerous outreaches which could not be done without faithful members who take part in or donate to each project. It would be amazing to know the amount of time each of you who serves spends in a year! I add my thanks along with the entire council and Pastor Jeff to our wonderful community of givers and doers. 2022 Final Audit report

Our team met for the first time on Jan 29th. At this meeting we discussed goals of the team and timeframe for when audit would be completed.

Darrel Bjornson. Feb 14th. Assignment Mar 22, Aug 22 months for audit review Janell Jenson. Feb 17th. Assignment Jan 22, Sep 22 months for audit review Tom Reynolds. Feb 17th. Assignment APS electric and Goodyear water for Audit review.

With instructions and a date of Mar 3rd to complete audit tasks.

On Mar 6th the team met with Ann and John with the following results and questions.

My analysis of APS 2 accounts one for A bldg and one for B bldg showed debits and credits were adjusted by APS based on usage. All payments made in a timely manner and on time.

My analysis of Goodyear water for 7 months January thru July showed an average monthly usage of 25 units or 25000 gallons for both A bldg and B bldg. Usage for Aug thru Dec monthly average jumped to 69 units or 69000 gallons. After further analysis I determined that A bldg was consistent for the entire year. B bldg was the Issue and not due to increase usage but DUE TO LEAK OR LEAKS. My findings were given to Randy and he agrees. JANUARY 2023 Bill shows no improvement over 2022 bills.

RECOMMENDATION: We contact City of Goodyear to help us determine and find Leaks and fix on B bldg water meter.

Darrel and Janell monthly reviews found NO MAJOR ISSUES. All questions were answered by either Ann or John to the satisfaction of the audit team.

RECOMMENDATION: After being on this audit team for 3 years my input would be we should have at least one member with accounting background on the team at all times. This would eliminate repeated questions asked by audit team every year.

Also I think this would eliminate the need for an audit by an outside independent auditor.
